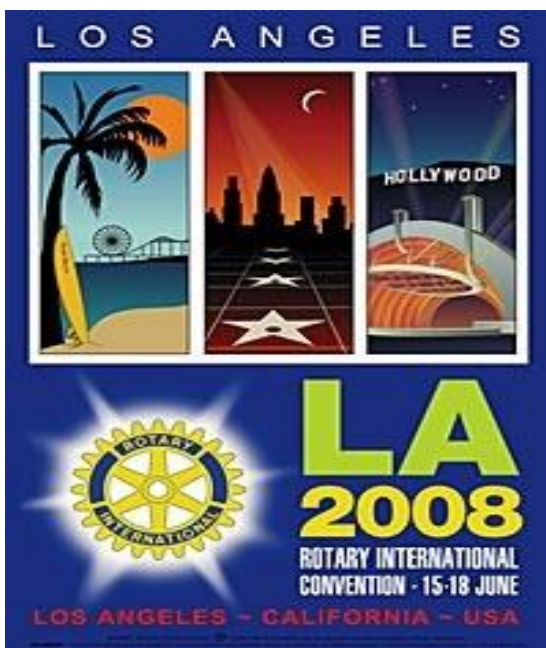
Eddy Longshore led the club in a "salute to ladies" rendition of the birthday song.

3. Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships?
4. Will it be Beneficial to All Concerned?"
